/	Zeal: Intense enthusiasm and fervor; in this context, it can refer to a passionate devotion to, though not always with true understanding.
/	Righteousness: Moral uprightness and conformity to standards; the state of being acceptable to God.
/	<i>Their own righteousness</i> : Righteousness by Law - The idea that one can achieve righteousness before God through strict adherence to the and its commandments.
<b>/</b>	Self-Righteousness: The attitude of believing oneself to be righteous and acceptable to God based on and works rather than on God's grace.
/	Law: In this context, it refers to the Old Testament given to Moses, including both moral and ritualistic commands.
<b>/</b>	Righteousness of Faith: The understanding that righteousness before God is a received through faith in Jesus Christ, rather than earned through good works.
